GPFA awards grants of over £100,000 to members in the last 5 years

Grants totalling £108,000 have been awarded by the Gloucestershire Playing Fields Association since 2012. Over 65 clubs, organisations, parish and town councils have benefitted from GPFA grant aid.

A wide range of projects and facilities have been supported, including playing field and pavilion improvements, playgrounds and youth sports start-up costs.

GPFA is proud to support the ongoing efforts of its dedicated members to improve their sports and play facilities. Generally, grants of up to 15% of the total project cost (to a maximum of £2,000) can be awarded for improvements to playing fields, playgrounds or sports facilities. Often an initial GPFA grant award can 'seed' other external grant funding bids for larger projects, where match-funding is needed, resulting in awards from other funding bodies being secured.

Grants have been given to improve playing field and playground sites in all districts across the county and into South Gloucestershire.

Helping our members to improve their facilities is one of the GPFA's key objectives, which remain largely unchanged since the Association was founded in 1926. Today, more than ever, it is important that everyone has access to good quality sport and play facilities and the GPFA will continue to lend its support to members who work so hard to help their local communities stay active.

Fields in Trust - Centenary Fields

Fields in Trust runs the Centenary Fields programme. Working across the UK in partnership with The Royal British Legion, the initiative aims to secure recreational spaces in perpetuity, to honour the memory of the millions of people who lost their lives in World War I.

Fields in Trust (FiT) has been in the business of providing legal protection for playing fields, play space, recreation grounds, nature reserves and other open spaces since its formation as the National Playing Fields Association in 1925. They currently protect more than 2,500 public recreational spaces, through legally binding agreements, for the long term.

The Centenary Fields programme was launched in 2014 by FiT President HRH The Duke of Cambridge. Delivered in partnership with The Royal British Legion, it is proving to be a unique way to commemorate the World War I centenary and remember those who lost their lives during the conflict, by protecting outdoor recreational spaces in perpetuity for the benefit of future generations.

Landowners, including town and parish councils and playing field associations across the UK are encouraged to dedicate a recreational space as a Centenary Field. Suitable spaces include war memorial playing fields and recreation grounds, memorial gardens, parks or rec-

reation grounds that contain a war memorial and other valued green spaces that have some significance to WWI, either existing or planned.

"Grassroots sports grounds are so important to nurturing the sports stars of tomorrow and giving people somewhere to enjoy sport. The Fields in Trust initiative is a unique and fitting way for sports clubs with a connection to World War I to protect their grounds for future generations to enjoy."

Countless sports clubs saw conflict stop play during World War I, as many players and sometimes even entire teams went to the front line. FiT want to ensure their sacrifice is recognised as part of our Centenary Fields programme and are inviting sports clubs that are more than 100 years old and either own or lease (at least 99 years) their ground to apply.

2018 marks the 100 year anniversary of the end of the First World War and the deadline for Centenary Fields applications is 11th November 2018.

New £80k skatepark at Lechlade

An exciting new skatepark at Lechlade Memorial Hall and Recreation Ground Charity will be officially opened on Sunday 15 April, with professional riders giving a demonstration of their skills.

The project is part of a £1.5 million project to rebuild the community hall, which was destroyed in an arson attack in May 2016. The new hall will be larger in size with more parking and has been built partly over the site of the previous popular, but dated, skate park.





A huge fundraising effort by the Lechlade charity, in partnership with Lechlade Town Council, raised the funding for the new facility, designed by Gravity Skateparks.

GPFA has supported the project with a £2,000 grant, along with other funders, including a £10,000 grant from the Gloucestershire Police and Crime Commissioner.

The new skatepark has been named 'The Barrow' after archaeological investigation during construction found a Bronze Age burial pit under the site. The facility will cater for scooters, BMX and skateboarders.

The opening event and demo will involve professional riders, who will also teach local youngsters some tricks. It is due to take place on Sunday 15th April starting at 12.00pm, but is weather dependent and will be postponed if it is raining (or snowing!).

Sport England updates guidance on playing field planning applications

Sport England has updated and re-launched its guidance on planning applications affecting playing fields, with the



aim of further protecting the public spaces in which people get physically active. It is the first major update to the guidance since it was first published in 1997, when local planning authorities were first required to formally consult Sport England on planning applications which affect playing field land.

By providing clearer and more detailed advice, the updated guidance will help applicants, local planning authorities and other parties understand Sport England's role and how applications are assessed.

Sport England's policy is to object to applications, unless they meet one of five specific exceptions – such as the proposals improving the use of a playing field, or replacement playing field land being provided as part of the plans.

The new version of the guidance, published in March 2018, has updated the wording and details for the five objections, bringing them in line with modern planning practices.

3G Pitches available at Oxstalls Sports Park


If your team would like to train or play matches on a new, top-class artificial sports surface, there is still some community use availability at weekends for
